CHOPIN, A SONATA IN PARIS

(CHOPIN, CHOPIN!)

MICHAŁ KWIECIŃSKI

THUR 11TH (18.00)

Director Michał Kwieciński and rising star actor Ervk Kulm reprise their successful collaboration on Filip (2022) with this lavish period piece on the life of Poland's greatest composer. Following Chopin (Kulm) in his final years, the film begins with his residence and fame in Paris firmly established, as is his position as the aristocracy's pianist of choice. His friendships and relationships include fellow wanderers and expatriates Franz Liszt (Victor Meutelet) and the Countess Delfina Potocka (Karolina Gruszka), and writer George Sand (Joséphine de la Baume). As the illness that would kill him takes hold. Chopin considers his personal and professional legacy.

The screening will include a special introduction on Frédéric Chopin from acclaimed pianist Hugh Tinney.



BEAUTIFUL! (PRZEPIEKNE!)

KATARZYNA PRIWIFZIENCEW

FRI 12TH (18.30)

Katarzyna Priwieziencew's deceptively simple film follows six women at different stages of their lives as each strives for fulfilment. Among them: Magda (Marta Nieradkiewicz), who is eager to resume the career she put on hold for her children: teacher Basia (Marta Scislowicz), who must contend with colleague and friend-with-benefits Kuba (Konrad Elervk) pressuring her for a more conventional relationship; Krystyna (Hanna Śleszyńska), who desperately wants to put the spark back in her marriage; and content creator Julia (Kamila Urzędowska, Chłopi), strugaling with the constant pressure to reach greater levels of beauty. The experiences of these women make for a funny, touching, and emotionally rewarding piece.



THE SARAGOSSA MANUSCRIPT

(RĘKOPIS ZNALEZIONY W SARAGOSSIE)

WOJCIECH HAS

SAT 13TH (13.30)

We celebrate the centenary of one of the great Polish directors with this screening of one of his bestknown films. The work of Wojciech Has is famed for its rich, often surreal imagery, a characteristic very much in evidence in The Saragossa Manuscript, This labvrinthine set of stories within stories begins with an officer in the Napoleonic Wars finding a book in the house in which he has taken refuge. The pages concern Alfonse (Zbigniew Cybulski), whose travels through Spain lead him to a series of encounters that in turn lead to further tales in this strange. magnificent epic of Polish cinema.

WOJCIECH SMARZOWSKI

SAT 13TH (17.20)

A peerless chronicler of the ills of Polish society. Woiciech Smarzowski turns his fierce gaze on relationships of coercive control and domestic violence. Vivacious. **Juminous Gosia (Agata Turkot)** meets recently divorced politician Grzesiek (Tomasz Schuchardt) on a dating site. When the two finally meet, they quickly fall in love and are married, living their dream life. However, nothing is as it seems. Her husband's rampant darkness takes charge, gaslighting leading to excuses and forgiveness as her marriage becomes a prison. Never gratuitous, the film, filled with branches of Kieślowskian consequences to Gosia's choices. is an intense indictment of the institutions that side with the charming, influential monster destroying every particle of Gosia.

ARTUR WYRZYKOWSKI

SUN 14TH (16.10)

Artur Wyrzykowski's feature debut is an extremely tense and gripping portrayal of parental love even in the face of the most horrific of circumstances, Bartek (Tomasz Schuchardt) is a crisis management expert whose skills come to unexpected use when his teenage son Daniel (Borys Otawa) murders his school bully. Holed up in the apartment of fiancée Maja (Paulina Gałazka), Bartek plans to flee the country with Daniel. When Maja tells him she is pregnant, and suspicion dawns that Daniel's story may not be the whole truth, Bartek's dilemma worsens, forcing decisions upon him as the net closes around his son.

AGNIFSZKA HOLLAND

SUN 14TH (18.00)

A self-professed admirer of the Czech writer since her early years. Agnieszka Holland's ambitious biopic manages to combine a straightforward account of Kafka's life with a number of stylistic flourishes that paint him on a much larger canvas, separating the man from the industry that now exists around his name. As portrayed by Idan Weiss (and the likeness is at times uncanny). Kafka is a sensitive young man, introverted and though out of step with the world around him, not above its temptations: as portrayed by Holland, he is a colossus, unique in the canon and a writer whose work deserves better than to be fodder for pop culture references and memes.


In a cramped house in a Rio de Janeiro favela, Malu (Yara de Novaes), a once-promising actress now unemployed and emotionally volatile, shares a tense, codependent existence with her conservative mother and her estranged adult daughter. Haunted by the memory of her theatrical past and yearning to convert her home into an arts centre, Malu teeters between self-destruction and reconciliation. When her daughter returns to care for her during a grave neurological illness, the three women are forced to confront generational trauma, love, and betrayal. The film becomes a raw, compassionate portrait of a woman struggling to become the version of herself she always imagined.

Two newly dead young people meet in the streets of Athens, amid the pulsing cityscape and the ghosts of history. One a translator, the other a photographer, they were outsiders in life; in death they struggle with the residue of their longings and mistakes. They wander the city together, finding consolation in the difficult beauty of existence and its aftermath.

CHARLIE KAUFMAN

SUN 7TH (17.30)

Perhaps in an attempt to ensure his vision made it to the screen unmediated, writer Charlie Kaufman took on directorial responsibilities for the first time with the remarkable Synecdoche, New York. A film of such complexity as to demand repeat viewings to unravel everything it reaches for, it centres on Caden Cotard (Philip Seymour Hoffman), a theatre director whose personal life is falling apart even as a MacArthur Fellowship allows him new professional possibilities. He creates a mimetic New York that expands over the years and decades that follow, blurring the reality and fiction of its cast/population in dizzying ways.



Two middle-class Dublin couples get together for a Christmas Eve party which degenerates into a kind of Irish Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf (with a whiff of Abigail's Party). Alcohol causes smug exteriors to slip and reveals unpleasant truths.

Like their earlier *Exposure*, this full blown critique of the Irish middle classes, co-authored by Kieran Hickey and Philip Davison, explores infidelity, sexual frustration, and gulfs of misunderstanding between the sexes.

Criminal Conversation (a legal term for adultery) reveals the despair of men and women in a country where divorce would not be legalised for another 16 years. The cast of fine young actors in their prime includes Emmet Bergin, Deirdre Donnelly, Peter Caffrey, and Leslie Lalor.

This screening will be followed by a Q&A with writer Philip Davison.

"What a Glorious Feelin", the IFI's Youth Panel is screening Gene Kelly and Stanley Donen's *Singin' In The Rain* (1952) as their December choice. 

WE ONLY WANT THE EARTH: THE LIFE AND IDEAS OF JAMES CONNOLLY

ALAN GILSENAN

TUE 16TH (18.20)

An iconic presence on the landscape of Irish socialism and republicanism, the name of James Connolly looms large in the trade union movement and wherever radical left-wing politics are espoused. Here Alan Gilsenan positions Connolly's radical ideas and political achievements within the contemporary political landscape, as well as documenting his prominent role in the 1916 Rising. The film draws on reflections of many distinguished commentators, union activists and historians, and on performance from musicians and artists such as Christy Moore, Stephen Rea, Esosa Ighodaro, piper David Power, singer Eoghan Ó Ceannabháin, and Connolly's great-greatgranddaughter Tamsin Iona Connolly Heron.

The film aims to reclaim Connolly's story and his important social vision and is sure to enlighten and inspire contemporary viewers.

THE BOTANIST

(ZHI WU XUE JIA)

JING YI

WED 17TH (18.20)

Chinese writer-director Jing Yi's contemplative debut feature draws on his own Xinjiang roots and Kazakh heritage in an evocative exploration of memory and place. Thirteen-year-old Arsin lives with his grandmother in a remote village near Kazakhstan, where life moves untouched, a world out of time. Arsin helps his older brother herd sheep, but he's also a budding botanist cataloguing local flora, finding refuge in the vast natural vistas of Xinjiang, and losing himself in the reverie of traditional folk beliefs. He befriends Meiyu, a Han girl whose nature reminds Arsin of a rare, otherworldly plant. Exquisitely shot in 4:3 aspect ratio to perfectly represent the boy's dreamlike state, we are transported by the wonderful music of Iranian pianist and composer Peyman Yazdanian.

When photographer Robert Kincaid wanders into the settled 1960s homelife of Italian Francesca (Meryl Streep), he sparks four days of an emotional rollercoaster as the pair fall deeply in love. Following Good Vibrations (2012), their vibrant chronicle of the life and times of Belfast punk maven Terri Hooley, directors Lisa Barros D'Sa and Glenn Levburn turn to more recent national cultural history in Saipan, an account of one of the most infamous episodes in Irish sport. Having qualified for the 2002 World Cup, led by talismanic captain Roy Keane (Éanna Hardwicke, displaying an impressive glower and very much the hero of the piece) and under the management of Mick McCarthy (Steve Coogan), the Republic of Ireland team arrive on the titular island to prepare for their campaign. Driven and uncompromising, Keane grows increasingly frustrated with the poor resources and his teammates' lack of commitment. Open hostility quickly breaks out between him and the ever-more downtrodden and woebegone McCarthy in a film with appeal far beyond that of the football audience.

Local garage owner Vahid thinks he recognises the man as the officer who once tortured him in prison. Driven by a desire for revenge, Vahid kidnaps the stranger. However, as he seeks confirmation of the man's identity from fellow former prisoners, including a bookseller, a wedding photographer, and a newlywed couple, the group grapples with moral dilemmas about vengeance and the possibility of mistaken identity. A welcome streak of mordant gallows humour adds an extra layer to what is already a caustic satire of an oppressive regime and its legacy of trauma.

Few directors have exerted an influence so large with a body of work so small as French director Jean Vigo, who died of tuberculosis in 1934 at the age of 29. This oeuvre, essential viewing for any aspiring cinephile, comprises two short films, the mid-length Zéro de conduite (1933), and his sole feature, L'Atalante, here given a 4K rerelease. Working with cinematographer Boris Kaufman, Dziga Vertov's younger brother, and Michel Simon, star of Jean Renoir's Boudu Saved From Drowning (1932), the film tells of the tumultuous marriage of Jean (Jean Dasté) and Juliette (Dita Parlo) as they and their crew journey through France on the titular barge. A wonder of lyrical beauty, the film is also a tantalising glimpse of what might have been.

Rereleased on the occasion of its fiftieth anniversary. Dog Day Afternoon recounts the true story of an attempted bank robbery in Brooklyn, 1972. Sonny (Al Pacino, reuniting with his Serpico director) and Sal (the great John Cazale) go ahead as planned with their heist after being abandoned by the third member of their gang. Things immediately go wrong as the bank is almost empty of cash and a hostage situation develops very quickly. In the course of negotiations, it comes out that Sonny's motive was to secure enough money to pay for the sexual reassignment surgery of his lover Leon (Chris Sarandon). Groundbreaking at the time for its thoughtful and sympathetic consideration of gender and sexuality, though of its time when viewed through a contemporary lens, Dog Day Afternoon is a gripping, funny, and moving film, a classic of 1970s Hollywood.



Beginning with a period of artistic uncertainty in the late 1990s and early 2000s, the documentary follows Bowie's quietly confident comeback, a period which saw him conquer Glastonbury's Pyramid stage, confront his past in suburban South London, experiment with the future of the internet, and write his first musical, all of which culminated in his daring final album Blackstar, released just two days before his death. Through rare interviews with collaborators and archival footage and insight into his creative process, the film reveals how Bowie confronted mortality not with resignation but with boundarypushing ambition. Told by those who knew and worked with Bowie, the film uncovers the strategic brilliance behind the resurrection, and the inexhaustible creativity of this singular artist.
